JUDAS AND PETER: A STUDY IN FAILURES

Our society seems to think of successful people as those who never fail. In reality truly successful people are those who have learned how to handle failure. Albert Einstein was successful in his field even though he failed certain school subjects the first time. On the other hand, many other students never learned to handle failure and therefore never succeed.

In looking at the lives of the apostles, one sees that not all of them were successful in their positions. In fact, two of them, Judas and Peter, are very prominent in that they failed our Lord in a spectacular manner. However, the way in which each man handled his failure shows a vivid contrast. Indeed, it is the difference between success and failure.

Comparison of Failures - No two apostles seem to have less in common than Judas and Peter. The incident with Mary and the nard in John 12:1-6 shows that Judas was a thief. Jesus Himself called Judas a devil in John 6:66-71. On the ther hand, Peter often showed the qualities of a leader. He was usually the first one to speak up. He made the good convession in Matt. 16:13-17. In John 6 he is the one who utters those grand words, "Lord, to whom shall we go? Thou hast the words of eternal life." And yet, their failures at the time of the crucifixion were very similar. Judas made a deal with the Jews to deliver Jesus to them. Jesus knew this and even told of it at the Passover (John 13:21-30). Judas then had the audacity to betray our Lord with a kiss. Jesus also foretold Peter's three denials in Luke 22:31-34. Of course, this is what eventually happened. Both men failed their Lord and Master. Why do we have such contrasting feelings about them?

On the surface each at first reacted in a similar fashion. Judas was sorrowful and took back the thirty pieces of silver (Matt. 27:3-4). Peter was also sorrowful and went out and wept bitterly (Luke 22:26). Here the similarity ends. Judas became despondent, gave up, and went and hanged himself (Matt. 27:5-9). Peter persevered, reaffirmed his love for Jesus and lived a long and fruitful life for the Lord. This man who had failed so miserably had the courage to tell the Jews they had murdered the Son of God (Acts 2). What a story this would have been had Judas been the speaker. Peter was later the first to preach the gospel to the Gentiles (Aces 10). This was indeed a major recovery.

What do we learn from the lives of Judas and Peter that can help us handle our own failure? First, we must admit our weakness and failure. It is ovbious that all of us fail from time to time (Rom. 3:23). Second, we must truly repent of our sin. This is much more than simple sorrow. Both of these men felt sorrow, but only Peter really had a change of heart that led to a change in his life. Sorrow is not repentance, but godly sorrow does lead to repentance (2 Cor. 7:9-11). Third, this repentance must lead to what Paul called "works worthy of repentance" (Acts 26:20). This is the manifestation that we have genuinely repented. Fourth, do not let past failure drag you down in the present. Paul said that he lessons that we learned from those experiences. Ironically, Peter speaks of those who had forgotten their past cleansing form sin (2 Pet. 1:9-11). May we learn to make success of our failures. author unknown
