### AN UNATTAINABLE GOAL?

Each time I read through the New Testament I am impressed with the magnificent strength of character which so many of Jesus' followers attained. Look at Peter, early on a timid fisherman who fell at Jesus' feet saying, "Depart from me, for I am a sinful man, O Lord"; later, an immovable rock of faithfulness able to affirm with boldness, "His divine power has granted to us everything pertaining to life and godliness" (Luke 5:8; 2 Pet. 1:3). And what about John? At first a brash, young "son of thunder", who then focused his energies toward serving Jesus and in the eve of his life confessed, "I have no greater joy than to hear of my children walking in the truth" (3 John 4). And Paul, once a blasphemer, a violent aggressor, a persecutor of Christ "breathing threats and murder against the disciples of the Lord"; later, a joyful Christiah happily singing praises to God while imprisoned for the cause of Christ (Acts 9:1; 16:25).

Why can't you and I be that kind of Christian?

were inspired apostles, true. But this guaranteed only that they would be faithful communicators of God's will, not faithful practitioners of it (Gal.2:11-14). They were not supernaturally charged with a moral stamina that enabled them to easily ward off the temptations that came their way. Theirs was a slow, painstaking road to spiritual maturity. These early Christians simply began with a love for Jesus and an appreciation for what God had done for them, then cultivated this daily to make it grow and blossom, developing in themselves an overwhelming adoration for spiritual things, and an unquenchable desire to do right.

What prevents us from following this same course? Paul said, "I bow my knees before the Father... that he would grant you according to the riches of his glory to be strengthened with power through his Spirit in the inner man" (Eph. 3:14, 16). Either Paul's prayer was a vain petition, or by the mighty power of the word of God we can be strengthened to be the kind of Christians we know we should be, that we've always dreamed of being. We can be steadfast soldiers of the cross, unafraid of the devil's weaponry, and unwavering when confronted with adversity. We can be confident in death, not fearful; so assured of that promised eternal home with God that we can say each day with the confidence of the apostle, "to live is Christ, and to die is gain!" (Phil. 1:21).

What hinders us from such a spiritual achievement? Perhaps, in part, a lack of faith; a failure to really believe God's way is the best way, and that every aspect of God's will is designed for our ultimate good. We tend to serve God in a general way, but in certain particulars we are not content to let the Father's will be done. The course he lays out just doesn't seem best to us. We need to consider well the truthfulness of Jeremiah's affirmation, "A man's way is not in himself; nor 3 it in a man who walks to direct his steps" (10:23). (concluded on back)

And then, perhaps we are too impatient for spiritual maturity to take place. The attributes of a Christian are of such a nature that they need to be diligently practiced, and that takes time (2 Pet. 1:5-10). Spiritual strength, no matter how greatly desired, cannot be developed overnight; it must be cultivated over a lifetime. And curiously, if one thinks he has completely attained it, in all probability he has not. "Not that I have already obtained it, or have already become perfect, but I press on in order that I may lay hold..." (Phil. 3:12).

"The word of God is living and active and sharper than any two edged sword," said the Hebrew writer (4:12). It is so powerful that it can take a man with a submissive will and make him into a stalwart Christian. Lord, help us to be submissive.
