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NEGLECT

"How shall we escape if we neglect so great a salvation?" (Heb. 2:3)

What does it mean to "neglect" salvation? The word translated "neglect" in Hebrews is translated in Matt. 22:5 by a phrase "made light of." The phrase brings to mind a balance in which one weighs what he values; when worldly things tip the scale, he is allowing things of God to be light, unimportant in his judgment. So he "makes light of," neglects, his great salvation. It does not mean that what he does is inherently evil or immoral. It means he has made it evil by allowing it to be unduly important in his thinking.

The "balance" may be between assembling with the saints on the one hand, or "sleeping in" on the other. Any number of mocent activities may hinder what should be our primary purpose in life. We may be weighing in the balance "laying by in store" on the first day of the week as opposed to a shopping spree during a holiday season or spending more for equipment for a favorite hobby or sport. Things innocent in themselves can constitute neglect if they become more important than salvation.

The choice may be in the realm of nutrition; of the flesh or of the spirit. Actually, there is not a choice to be made here, for nutrition of both flesh and spirit are necessary; but when men and women who "never miss a meal" as far as fleshly food is concerned regard Bible study (at home or with the saints) as nonessential or unimportant, which kind of nutrition "weighs" more with them? Obviously they are making light of the great salvation. If you had to make a choice between being healthly physically or being healthly spiritually, which would you choose? Which would weigh more with you?

Suppose you had to make a choice between being materially prosperous or being spiritually prosperous. Which would you choose? In 3 John 2 John said "Beloved, I pray that in all things you may prosper and be in health, even as your soul prospers." Financial prosperity and spiritual prosperity are not mutually exclusive; but if you could have only one, which would you choose? In most cases we are allowed a degree of physical prosperity while still enjoying spiritual well-being. The temptation is to enhance our physical well-being "for a while" at the expense of spiritual concerns. There is a Biblical character who had this problem. The Lord said to him, "Thou foolish one, this night is thy soul required of thee, and the things which thou hast prepared, whose shall they be?" (Luke 12:20).

Don't neglect our great salvation.

CHRIST-I-A-N
