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## ZEAL AND KNOWLEDGE

"Brethren, my heart's desire and prayer to God for Israel is that they might be saved. For I bear them record that they have a zeal for God, but not according to knowledge" (Rom. 10:1-2).

The force of zeal can be a tremendous power for good or evil, depending on the guiding principles of right and wrong. Religious history is filled with examples of corruption brought about by misguided people. Thinking they were serving God, they instead served the devil. Zeal is like the mighty force that propels a multi-ton rocked into space, but without the guidance system this power would be utterly wasted or tremendously destructive. So it is with the one who has religious zeal but who lacks the knowledge of the Word of God.

In the letter to the church at Laodicea, recorded in Rev. 3:19, Jesus said to this apathetic group, "As many as I love, I buke and chasten: be zealous therefore, and repent." This requirement to be zealous is demanded of all who serve the Lord acceptably. But this zeal necessitates a knowledge of God's will. In Romans 10:3 the Lord says, "For they being ignorant of God's righteousness, and going about to establish their own righteousness, have not submitted themselves to the righteousness of God." Ignorance of God's righteousness does not stifle zeal, but simply allows it to be misguided.

Secondly, it will be noticed from this passage that if one is ignorant of God's righteousness, zeal will cause the one who possesses it to establish his own style of righteousness. In other words, he will create his own religion based on the power of zeal without a knowledge of God's will. We should also note that those who have zeal without knowledge will not submit to God. There are probably many reasons for this. Maybe God's ways are too slow, not modern enough or don't "make sense" to them.

The apostle described himself before he obeyed the truth as, "Circumcised on the eighth day, of the stock of Israel, of the tribe of Benjamin, a Hebrew of the Hebrews; as touching the law, a Pharisee, concerning zeal, persecuting the church..." (Phil. 3:5-6). This is zeal without knowledge which the apostle acknowledged to be opposing God.

The correct combination of zeal, knowledge, maturity, caution and all the other qualities that make up a working servant of the Lord is difficult to attain. It can't be found in the immature, but if we wait till age overtakes us and we have made no start, we still won't have the experience. Perhaps this warning from Paul is a good place to start. When the desire to serve God first forms within us we need to act on it, but not in a misdirected way. Be cautious that we know what God thinks about our intended action. Read, study, work.

eal without knowledge is dangerous. Knowledge without zeal is useless. Let us prepare ourselves to serve God, then serve Him with all our resources.

# What Kind of "Complex"?

David tried to rear his son Adonijah without any "no's."

"And his father had not displeased him at any time in saying, Why have you done this?" (I Kings 1:6). A study of Adonijah's life as recorded in I Kings will reveal the neurotic misfit that resulted.

Telling a child "no" will not give him a complex, but letting him grow without restriction will certainly do just that. A child needs many thtings from his parents. Two of the more important are a sense of direction - a pointing toward God - and some guideposts to keep him on the road. These guideposts must include some "do not's" as well as some "do's." Christian parents will find the basis for both affirmative and negative commands in God's Word. The child without such restraint has no means of learning except by his own trial and error, which makes the road doubly long and difficult.

Parents today are trying, like David, to rear a child without any "no's", and are similar to a person who would turn a pet canary loose in the outside world and expect it to survive. The world our children must live in has many "no's". Obedience to these is a necessary prerequisite for successful living in it. When we "turn a child loose" who has no respect for a negative command, we can expect him to fail.
